SARDIS FOCUSES ON HUNGER

Our Fall focus on hunger began in September with Sardis Academy sessions that focused on hunger and included our participation in Operation Sandwich. We collected funds to purchase supplies to make 200 meat, cheese and egg salad sandwiches for hungry neighbors through Urban Ministries.

We'll continue our focus on hunger through the month of October with participation in the CROP Walk as well as a food drive for Second Harvest Food Bank.

Charlotte CROP is a poverty-fighting organization that honors the call to improve the quality of life of people suffering from poverty and hunger. They educate, inspire and empower the Charlotte community to become agents of change through fund-raising events with local and international impact.

Sardis Baptist is building a team of walkers to participate in the annual CROP Walk on Sunday, October 16th. The length of the walk is 3.6 miles, which symbolizes the average round trip people in developing nations make daily to get water. You can register to join our team or to sponsor Sardis walkers with donations at crophungerwalk.org/charlottenc/sbc. Our goal is to have 25 walkers, 25 sponsors and earn \$2,500.

In existence since 1981, Second Harvest Food Bank of Metrolina strives through education, advocacy, and partnerships to eliminate hunger by the solicitation and distribution of food. Second Harvest provides a regional distribution warehouse and branches that supply food and grocery items to almost 700 charitable programs that assist people in need across a 19 county service area. They serve 14 counties in North Carolina and 5 counties in South Carolina.

A generous benefactor has challenged Sardis to collect shelf-stable food and other essential items for a Second Harvest food drive. Most needed food items are: Canned Fish or Meat, Peanut Butter, Pasta, Canned or Dry Beans, Soups, Canned Fruits in Juice, Canned Low-Sodium Vegetables and Whole Grain Cereals. Non-food items most in need are: Paper Products, Diapers, Cleaning Supplies and Personal Hygiene Items. Bring your donations to the church before November 6th. 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I LIFT UP MINE EYES..

A Prayer for Our City ~ During Wednesday's staff meeting, we struggled to make sense of the latest events in our city: Charlotte joined the growing list of neighborhoods affected by police shootings in recent weeks. Just like Milwaukee, Baton Rouge, Tulsa, and others, our city feels first-hand the confusion, fear, anger, and disappointment of another life lost. And just like our sister cities, we've seen first-hand the tension created between two distinct groups: those who experience tangible justice and those who don't.

As our staff gathered, we asked each other, "What do we say about this on Sunday? What action can we take? What candle can we light, what symbol can we create?"

After an hour, we were right where we started. We still didn't know what to say or do. We decided to reach for the words of a more modern prophet. We read Martin Luther King's Letter from Birmingham Jail. In January of 1963, Birmingham, Alabama was considered the most-segregated city in America. In an effort to call attention to injustices in Birmingham, civil rights activists organized protests, sit-ins and other demonstrations. A group of white clergymen wrote a letter to King, asking him stop the protests, and stop creating tension in the city. On Good Friday, King was arrested for demonstrating. He wrote this letter in response to his fellow clergy. Here are a few snippets:

We know through painful experience that freedom is never voluntarily given by the oppressor; it must be demanded by the oppressed. Frankly, I have yet to engage in a direct action campaign that was "well timed" in the view of those who have not suffered unduly from the disease of segregation. For years now I have heard the word "Wait!" It rings in the ear of every Negro with piercing familiarity. This "Wait" has almost always meant "Never." We must come to see, with one of our distinguished jurists, that "justice too long delayed is justice denied."

We have waited for more than 340 years for our constitutional and God given rights. The nations of Asia and Africa are moving with jetlike speed toward gaining political independence, but we still creep at horse and buggy pace toward gaining a cup of coffee at a lunch counter. Perhaps it is easy for those who have never felt the stinging darts of segregation to say, "Wait." But when you have seen vicious mobs lynch your mothers and fathers at will (continued on page 4)

Though one of their favorite places to live was Burlington, Washington (near Seattle), they are hoping to remain in North Carolina for Jourdan's next assignment.

(Continued from page 2) and drown your sisters and brothers at whim; when you have seen hate filled policemen curse, kick and even kill your black brothers and sisters; when you see the vast majority of your twenty million Negro brothers smothering in an airtight cage of poverty in the midst of an affluent society; when you suddenly find your tongue twisted and your speech stammering as you seek to explain to your six year old daughter why she can't go to the public amusement park that has just been advertised on television, and see tears welling up in her eyes when she is told that Funtown is closed to colored children, and see ominous clouds of inferiority beginning to form in her little mental sky, and see her beginning to distort her personality by developing an unconscious bitterness toward white people... When you are harried by day and haunted by night by the fact that you are a Negro, living constantly at tiptoe stance, never quite knowing what to expect next, and are plagued with inner fears and outer resentments; when you are forever fighting a degenerating sense of "nobodiness"-- then you will understand why we find it difficult to wait. There comes a time when the cup of endurance runs over, and men are no longer willing to be plunged into the abyss of despair. I hope, sirs, you can understand our legitimate and unavoidable impatience.

After reading King's words, we came to a conclusion: We have no conclusion! We don't know what to say to heal the racial discord in our city. There's not a sermon to preach, or a prayer to pray, or a passage to read, or a candle to light that will magically heal what ails us.

But here's what we do know: We worship a God who works in and through and with ALL people. And we worship a God whose spirit dwells in this place. And we worship a God who can and does and will offer healing to our community.

And so this is our prayer:

God, through your spirit, give us the ability to empathize with others. Help us to listen to and acknowledge the needs of those who can no longer wait for justice. And help us to create dialogue with those who seek to hoard justice, as if there wasn't enough to go around.

God, through your spirit, make us a creative people, a people who will use its varied gifts and talents to spread your love through this community.

God make us a discerning people, a collection of individuals who will ask in earnest: "What can I do to bring about healing?"


God, make us a persistent people, a people who will not run from hard conversations, but rather, a people who engage them head on




World Communion is celebrated by churches of many denominations in places throughout the world every year on the first Sunday of October. The purpose is to promote unity and ecumenical cooperation.
