

Over the past few months, several people have asked me where our weekly benediction comes from. I wrote it. And since you asked, I'll tell you how it came about.

In all the churches I've been a part of, both as a lay person and as a minister, there's always been a standard benediction. It's not that I didn't like the ones I've heard, it's just that I wanted something original. Something that made sense for me, and reflected the personality of the congregation I served. And something I could remember without a prompt. And something that I wanted to say more than once. And something the congregation would remember, too.

I think joy is paramount for worship. And paramount for life. And I think joy is what changes the world. Even the psalmist who cries from the depths, or hangs up her harp on the shores of Babylon, or walks through the darkest valley has known the goodness that comes from God's love. And even in their most vulnerable state, they never lose hope in a divine force that is steadfast, merciful, and transformative. They wait with expectant hope.

Each Sunday morning, we seek to express our expectant hope in God's possibilities. And we believe that such an expression has the power to move us into collective action, to be God's agents in the world.

When I speak this benediction, I remember a playful, mysterious, and wise God. And I see the faces of saints moved by God's spirit. And I remember all the choirs from former congregations. And I remember all the hands who've helped shape me. And I even took the ending from a church I served in seminary (thanks, Grace!).

And my grin turns into a smile. And my smiles turns into acts of kindness. And I join a chorus of love. And I hope you do. too!

As an intern of Historic Foodways in Colonial Williamsburg (Virginia), Amanda Lewis helped to re-create foods of the eighteenth century. In order to help twenty-first century folk understand how our ancestors prepared food and ate it, she learned to butcher hogs; the way colonials cut up their meat was different from the way we divide it up today. She also ground cacao seeds into cocoa; this was done by hand; only the tools of the colonial period were used.

Amanda spent seven months working with the Ghana Baptist Convention. She was part of the Yendi Initiative sponsored by Virginia Baptists to provide mosquito netting to Ghanians in an attempt to minimize the spread of malaria.

Rev. Lewis graduated from William and Mary with a degree in colonial history and in Africana studies, with an emphasis on the modern African diaspora (slave trade and more recent migration of African peoples to other locations and cultures). Further studies led her to McAfee School of Theology from which she received a Master of Divinity degree with an emphasis in pastoral care. While there, Rev. Lewis served as minister to college students at First Baptist Church of Athens (Georgia). She was ordained there on Mother's Day, 2017 and currently works as a chaplain with Atrium Health.

Amanda grew up in Smithfield, Virginia with one older sister. She is married to Bennett Henkel; they will celebrate their first anniversary on Christmas Eve.

Elizabeth Beltzhoover: "In our week at UniDiversity we spoke of the rhythms of Grace. As spoken in the book of Matthew, 'Grace is spoken in rhythms.' Throughout the week we were brought back to the central idea of rhythm in many ways. As the week progressed, I as well as many others grew closer to God. I very much enjoyed my time at camp and full well know that many others did as well."

Madison Kreutzer: "This past week I went to UniDiversity with Jonathan, Hilary, and Elizabeth. I had loads of fun. My favorite part was Shari Madkins (our camp pastor) because she was amazing. I met lots of people that I am hoping to stay in touch with!"

Jonathan Eidson: "The theme for this year's UniDiversity was Rhythms of Grace and Elizabeth, Hilary, Madison and I spent the week learning how to move from the often times chaotic rhythms of society to the rhythms of faith. Each day, we were a part of Bible study, seminars and electives of choice and worship but the time I enjoyed the most was the time we spent together in church group devotions talking about our day and calmly praying. We groaned collectively when the songs of the week got stuck in our minds but as I think about it, that was and is probably a big part of finding a new rhythm.

We laughed together and in Mellow Mushroom, we were laughing so loudly the whole restaurant wondered what was happening. It was a fantastic week and I'm grateful to be a part of a church that understands the importance of youth ministry and rhythms.

The challenge for all four of us and indeed Sardis as well is how do we all make the rhythms of faith ours each day."

Hilary Kearns: "From July 23 to July 28, Jonathan, Madison, Elizabeth and I attended UniDiversity. This was Jonathan's and my second year going and, like last year, we had a blast!

Each day we got up around 6am, spent several hours in worship, bible study, seminars on different aspects of religion, electives like kick ball and board games, explored the University of Tennessee campus, sometimes took naps, ate together, worshiped some more, and spent our evenings engaging in various outdoor activities—think twister on an air mattress, running from one end of campus to another trying to win starbucks gift cards, and inflatable obstacle courses that pitted youth against adult (an altogether unfair competition!).

We learned what it meant to follow the "Rhythms of Grace" as put forth by Christ in the gospel of Matthew. Our proclaimer, Shari Madkins, took us through the Sabbath and the importance of rest, how "God provides, [and] people divide" up the fruits of that provision, the importance of finding a quiet, separate place to pray and listen for God, and how to live into the "unforced rhythms of Grace."

This was a wholly transformational week and I know that all of us will remember it fondly!"

UPCA SCHOOL SUPPLIES

Worship at Sardis is much more than an hour on Sunday mornings! Sardis people worship all week long through word, deed and interactions with others. This month we'd like to offer a worship opportunity that will benefit students of University Park Creative Arts Elementary School. UPCA is a Title I school, meaning that many of the families live in highpoverty situations and many students are behind academically or at-risk of falling behind. Parents who are struggling to find secure housing or put food on the table are often unable to provide the long list of school supplies requested by teachers - and schools operating with tight budgets are not able to fill in the gaps. We are holding a school supply drive to help these students and families. The final day of our collection will be Sunday, August 19th. Following is a list of requested items: Backpacks (no wheels), Pencil Boxes or Pouches, Spiral I-Subject Notebooks, Composition Notebooks, I" and 2" Binders, 2-Count Colored Pencils, 24-Count Crayons, Markers, Rulers, Large Gluesticks, School Scissors, #2 Pencils, Wide-Ruled Notebook Paper, Plastic Pocket Folders, Ziplock Bags, Clorox Wipes, Tissues and Hand Sanitizer.

Your Trustees have been busy this summer, largely with minor maintenance issues. Plans are in the works to: replace the stoops in the playground area to comply with termite protection coverage; replace broken ballasts on overhead lights in our offices and kitchen; paint several interior offices and meeting rooms; and remove several large, dead tree limbs along the exterior of our grounds.

The Trustees are also addressing several longer-term and exciting enhancements for our property. Estimates are being procured for painting the exterior of the church and replacing the children's playground equipment. While there are funds set aside to help with these expenses, we would welcome additional contributions above and beyond the church's planned operating needs.

Finally, the Trustees continue to assess the financial health of both our operating fund and endowment funds, and make recommendations as necessary.
