
reminded that God's spirit resides in us, too!

I LIFT UP MINE EYES... Rev. Bob Stillerman

On Saturday, October 13th, a dozen Sardisians walked four miles. We rose early. Will filled our bellies with eggs, and coffee, and other proteins for the journey. We stretched. We wore athletic clothes and comfortable shoes. There was an even Emcee, and they sang the National Anthem. And people gave us water at the halfway point, and policemen stopped traffic for us. And a band serenaded us at the finish line. It was a long walk, but it was a fun one, too!

On that same Saturday, more than half-a-billion people around the world walked that same distance to get access to clean water. They'll do the same tomorrow, and the next day, and the next. And as they walk, there will be no pomp and circumstance.

Our church, and other faith houses in Charlotte, often participate in events like CROP Walk and hunger simulations to better understand the devasting effects of hunger and poverty. And we give to social service organizations, and participate in food drives in an effort to help end hunger and poverty both locally and globally.

If these events, activities, simulations, and offerings are to have ANY lasting merit and meaning, we have to make them consistent endeavors. Food banks don't just need food during the holidays. Access to clean water will still be necessary on October $14^{\rm th}$. Access for our most vulnerable neighbors to affordable healthcare, childcare, and housing will only become more difficult in the coming years.

This past month, I took 8,800 steps (at least that's what my pedometer said) toward ending hunger. And I brought in a few cans for the food drive. And I gave some spare change here and there to people I passed. And because you all participated in CROP Challenge, our family made a contribution in your honor. And it's making a difference. But my giving (and yours!) will only make a lasting difference if it becomes consistent throughout the year.

We may not be able to make a grand gesture every month. But we can bring one can of food as we are able. And we can say a prayer, or educate ourselves on the effects of poverty, or encourage others to give who haven't already. And maybe one day, we won't have to have a fancy walk for people to take notice of others in need. Until then, count your steps, and be generous with your spare change, and grab a can or two for the bin if you remember.

The barn brack bread Jean Lawrence made for celebration of World Communion at Sardis gives us a hint of her beginnings. She grew up in Yorkshire, England with a brother and two sisters. Though her early church experience was in the Church of England, she was dedicated in a Baptist church in her village. Her father was "doing his part" for the war effort (WWII); with the help of a friend and neighbor, her mother was introduced to a Baptist church nearby where the dedication could take place. Later, when Jean was about 13, she experienced a baptism "of greater years" in the Church of England and was also confirmed in the faith at that time.

"Teacher" is one of the words which sums up Jean's life. She graduated from Doncaster/Sheffield Teacher's College (a college of Sheffield University) with a degree in education, her major field being French. After taking up residence in NC, she earned a masters in education from the University of North Carolina/Charlotte and has National Board certification for world languages.. After teaching stints in Nottingham, England, and in Denmark, Jean married and moved to Greenville, SC. After another short move back home, she and her family came to Charlotte. She taught French at St. Patrick's School, at All Saint's School and at the CMS language immersion school.

Jean has a son who lives in Austin, Texas and a daughter who lives in Charlotte. She enjoys spending time with her grandchildren and with gardening. Her caring and nurturing spirit extends to her rescue dog, Juniper.

Jean first came to Sardis when friends from England (Roger and Janet) were visiting. She "felt welcome the day they came in the door."
