Sardis Baptist Church will host a Blessing of the Animals on Saturday, September 28th at 10:00 AM. The service is an opportunity to recognize and give thanks for every animal in our biosphere. All animals, insects and even microorganisms play a role in our ecosystem, and we'll give thanks for them all. Our pets have a special place in our lives and will have a special place in this service. Pet companions model unconditional love and affection. For many people, they provide companionship that is unavailable elsewhere. The service will offer a chance for each family's pet to receive an individual blessing, as well as a time of remembrance for departed pets. Children are encouraged to bring their favorite stuffed animals—teddy bears and stuffed flamingos need blessings too!

The Animal Blessing will take place next to the Sardis Picnic Pavilion on 5811 Sardis Road. Please do not bring food for your pets! We will have water bowls and dog treats available for our furry friends. For the safety of people and pets in attendance, all animals must be in pet cages or on leashes. We wish to bless our animals, not traumatize them, so please leave "scaredy cats" (and other pets) at home! Prayers transcend distance, so presence is not required. We encourage you to bring photos of pets with social anxiety or poor manners. We'll bless them from afar.

Our friends from Bullies 2 the Rescue will join us for this event. They'll gladly accept donations to support their efforts to rescue, rehabilitate and re-home French and English Bulldogs. Sardis friends are creating a photo display of beloved animals to remind us to continue offering prayers of health and thanksgiving for our animal friends in the months ahead. Sermon Topic: The Word lived and dwelled among us. If "us" is bigger than humanity, what does the life and work of Jesus mean for the whole of creation?

Talk-Back: Emanuel – God with us. How big is our us? What happens when we imagine that "us" encompasses all of creation? How does that change our language, our liturgies, and our outlook on God's world?


What happened to September and October?!? We live in a fast-paced world, one that expects you to be in a season well in advance of the actual season. And when the day/season actually gets here, you can't enjoy it, because you've got to prepare for the next thing in line.

We often ask the question: "What distinguishes faith communities from other communities?" I think our liturgies distinguish us. Our liturgies (that's a fancy way of saying our formal worship routines and traditions) are meant to establish a recognition, enjoyment and response to the seasons of life. Not before they happen. But as they are happening.

So...there may not be any Halloween Candy left at Walmart or Harris Teeter after October 1st, but we'll enjoy a Pumpkin Glow on October 27th, and we'll remember our saints or "hallowed ones" on November 3rd. We'll worship every Sunday, and we'll even share a few Sardis Academy meals (two this month! 9/11 and 9/18). But don't worry, you won't need an advanced reservation, nor will the hymns, prayers, sermons, and spirit be out of stock.

At Sardis, we're all about being present in this season. Because when we're present in the current season, be it ordinal, special, or once-in-a-generation, we allow ourselves to be mindful of all God has created, and to recognize our connectedness as part of God's creation. And that's real, not manufactured or manipulated by a retail calendar.

So come be part of the season, Sardis. But no need to rush. We plan to linger here for a little while.

Community is an integral part of Amy Weibke's being. At present she is making weighted blankets which are given to children with autism. Snuggling in this kind of quilt makes a child feel safe and secure as if (s)he is being hugged. Several other community organizations have benefitted from Amy's involvement. In the past she joined Habitat as a free-lance volunteer builder. With a group from St. Stephen, she provided, prepared and served dinner to the occupants of the Men's Shelter. She served through RAIN, ministering to people suffering from AIDS. During the time that her two daughters were growing up, she volunteered in various capacities in their schools.

Amy learned early that community and neighborliness is international. Along with her two brothers and her parents, she lived in Pittsburgh during her early childhood years. Her family often hosted international students from the near-by university, particularly during times that U.S. students went home for holidays.

The family moved to Charlotte as Amy moved into high school; she graduated from East Meck and then attended UNC-Charlotte, graduating with a degree in economics. She held part-time jobs with Harris-Teeter while in high school and college, and upon graduation became employed full-time in H-T's merchandising department and then in financial services. Now, post full-time mom/volunteer, Amy works two days a week at Green with Envy, a gift shop in Plaza-Midwood.

Amy's family includes husband Mark and adult daughters Emma and Katie. She enjoys walking, hiking and biking especially when she gets away to the mountains. Reading is also a favorite pastime. She describes Sardis as "the most warm and welcoming place of worship she has ever attended. Though small, it is big in many ways!"

FORT CASWELL NC Baptist Assembly

I still remember my first trip to the North Carolina Baptist Assembly at Fort Caswell. I was a student at Southeastern Seminary before the fall. I had just returned from Israel where I had, for two months, been a part of an archeological dig at Tel Migne Ekron. (I was digging in 7th Century BCE and we also had 10th Century BCE as well.) Prior to departing the United States for Israel, I interviewed for a part-time job as youth minister at First Baptist Church in Raleigh. I



had to leave before learning whether or not I got the job. Anne and I were dating at the time and she would learn my fate and relay that to me in Israel when I called from a pay phone at a pre-arranged time. Back then, a phone was a phone and a cell was just a cozy room in a prison. When I called Anne, she told me I had been called to FBC Raleigh.

At the end of the excavation season I took a brief trip to Egypt (hello pyramids, hello sphinx) and then flew back to Raleigh. I went to the office at FBC on a Thursday, joined the church on Sunday, had a fellowship and met the youth that night and departed for Youth Week at Caswell with them the following morning not knowing quite what to expect.

If you've ever been to Fort Caswell, you probably remember crossing the Oak Island bridge and driving the Caswell Road until it dead ends at the entrance to the Fort where, despite having our church name painted all over the van, we were thoroughly scrutinized by the security personnel. Driving into the grounds, you see a blending of past and present. The old fort covers much of the campus and many of the buildings around the parade ground have repeatedly been renovated and are in use today including the barracks building (where our group stays). I still remember being amazed by the beauty of the grounds. The Cape Fear River ambles by on one side of the camp and you can see South Port across it to the north and Bald Head Island to the east. You can stand on the beach and look at the Atlantic Ocean.

I was struck by the realization that a former military installation could be transformed into a facility hosting faith enriching programming providing spiritual growth for so many.

This trip, my first to Fort Caswell, took place 31 years ago in August of 1988. I bought Anne's engagement ring a month before! My co-chaperone for this year's trip, Hilary Kearns, had not been born yet.

Beach Retreat 2019 Fast forward to 2019! The CBF Fall Beach Retreat is September 20 - 22 at Fort Caswell. This year's theme is "Be Still..." and we'll be considering

the spiritual discipline of rest. How can we be still when our schedules are packed, we get too little sleep and societal expectations are that we're always on the go? We'll be making the discovery ourselves with the leadership of Jenny Lee, our retreat pastor and Rody Mastin, our camp musician. This is a free retreat for our youth!
