PUBLIC DEFENDER'S OFFICE: MENTALLY ILL AND DEVELOPMENTALLY DISABLED

Kristin Parker, a member of Sardis Baptist Church, has been a paralegal at the Mecklenburg County Public Defender's Office for over 27 years. Although in her work she handles many different duties, her passion and a primary focus of hers is working with clients who are mentally ill and developmentally disabled. Kristin will lead our Sardis Academy session on Wednesday, March 11th, and will talk to us about the intersection of the mental health and court systems. We'll discuss ways in which society can work toward diverting the mentally ill and developmentally disabled from the court system.

Data has proven that upward mobility in Charlotte is difficult for those born into poverty, and we know that poverty and hunger are linked. Bob will discuss the inequities that lead to hunger, and we'll discuss ways that Sardis Baptist can contribute to the solutions. Dinner will be served at 5:45 PM followed by the discussion. Our Fellowship Team generally collects money to offset the cost of providing fellowship dinners. In lieu of payment, we'll ask for donations to support our Easter effort to feed hungry families of a local Title I school over their spring break. The Season of Lent: Planting New Images of God

This morning, a cold, grey, rainy (and maybe even snowy!) Thursday in February, I stare out the window, looking at a majestic oak. Despite being laid bare by every element that winter can throw at it, this tree stands tall, its spine straight, its trunk undaunted, its roots dug in deep, its branches extending their affection. And some forty days from now, it will bear new life: luscious green leaves that will delight my senses, and shelter me from summer's heat, and serenade me in autumn with colors that have yet to be invented, or even imagined. Its resurrection is certain. And yet its certain resurrection brings me surprise, no matter how many times I see it.

I suppose I could lament the current season, just live in sorrow that summer's out of order, just imagine God's on leave till May. But my mind gets to wandering and wondering, and I can't help but think about that tree outside. On the surface, it appears my mighty oak is taking a beating, has been broken by the harsh elements around her, the ones that leave her so vulnerable and exposed. But she isn't vulnerable. She is protected. Somewhere, underneath the soil, all kinds of life-giving reactions are happening – God's getting busy with a restoration project. God is soil and sun penetrating through gray clouds, and rain, and even those pesky acorns we have to bend over and pick up. And God's is a future shaded by green leaves.

There's another empty tree I see, but it's not outside. It's the cross that hangs in our meetinghouse. And every Lenten season I feel a sense of dread. Must we expend SO MUCH energy on that wretched, barren tree, that tree which reminds us of our faults, and of the violence in our world, and of just how unaware we've been of God's presence among us? Must we make the cross a transaction, and use this season to pay our penance in order that we might earn the joy of Easter?

Well, no, actually, we mustn't. Because, just as the barren tree in February does not tell the whole story of the oak, the empty cross does not tell the whole story of God.

The season of Lent offers us an opportunity to be surprised, once more, by the new life God is creating, even in winter. Lent is not a time for despair or shame. Lent is a time to reawaken ourselves to the miraculous, transformative, hopeful, inclusive, affirming, unending grace God offers to help heal and (continued on back page)

Disrupting the World's Power Structure

Shocked, I stood up, turned right, and walked up the aisle and out the doors of the chapel building on the seminary campus. It was the last decade of the twentieth century, and it was Women's Day, the celebration of which included a chapel address. The speaker was male, and his exhortations to women included the expected behavior held by some men: immaculate house, gourmet meals (on time!), perfect children. As the "sermon" progressed, the speaker began an intrusive foray into my bedroom. I was told in no uncertain terms what I should not wear when retiring for the night, with the implication that a "hootchy-kootchy" outfit was the approved sleeping apparel. I felt embarrassed and demeaned.

Second-hand information came to me that the next day that I was labeled in some classes as the feminist heretic on campus. I suppose that refusing to submissively sit and listen to instruction in how to fulfill a man's fantasies was somehow a rejection of the faith.

The interruption of a social order followed by a majority does produce some strange reactions. For those who perceive themselves as being more important, who are accustomed to being deferred to, accepting women as equals, rather than as attendants, seems like a breaking apart of the natural order.

A few people still become agitated over the issue of women in ministry. After a couple years of filling a supportive role in the missions ministry of a large church, I was called as missions minister when the man who had held that position moved to another church. The church had ordained women as deacons since the 1940's and had ordained at least one woman into church ministry, but, except for children's minister, had not had a woman on the ministerial staff. Shaken by this disruption of precedence, one of the male ministers on staff visited my office. He left after an hour of verbally assaulting me. His voice was quiet, calm and seemingly harmless. He began by condescendingly asking (continued on back page)

Traditionally, on the Christian holidays of Christmas and Easter we offer the opportunity to honor special people in our lives with visual reminders in worship of the love we have for them: poinsettias at Christmas and lilies at Easter. This year we are putting worship in action and honoring our loved ones a little differently. We invite you to purchase goodness groceries in lieu of lilies. The groceries will be donated to food insecure families that attend Charlotte Secondary School, a neighborhood charter school where 60% of students qualify for free and reduced lunch. Through donations, the school provides food for students during the week, however, weekends and holiday breaks are often times of hunger.

Our Missions Team will use the funds collected from goodness groceries to purchase non-perishable food items to feed food insecure students and their families over spring break. The cost for each bag is \$20. Order forms are available at the church.



On March 29th your Sardis Baptist Church Choir will present its annual Spring Cantata. In keeping with this year's Lenten theme, the cantata will be a collection of anthems representing different styles and cultural ideas of God. And, because the theme is informed by Sardis members' own ideas, there will be several congregational hymns woven throughout the program.

If you are musically inclined, please consider joining the choir on Wednesday nights at 7:30 PM as we prepare for this presentation. If you love music but don't consider yourself "choir-ready" you will still be able to join us in worship on the 29th as we sing our hymns. We look forward to sharing our music with all of you!

The Sardis Baptist Board of Trustees, along with assistance from our treasurer, and input from our pastor, create a financial ministry plan each year to ensure that the use of church funds supports the covenant we've made to each other as a church family as well as local and global missions. The 2020 ministry plan is currently under development and will be presented to the congregation for review in late March. A church conference will be called for you to have an opportunity to ask questions and to vote whether you approve. The date of the conference will be determined later this month.



Please join our Buildings & Grounds Team for a church workday on Saturday, April 4th beginning at 9:00 AM. Many hands make fast work! We have some Spring cleaning to do around the Sardis meetinghouse and grounds. Bring gloves and rakes. We plan to clean up yard debris, pull weeds, spread mulch, and spruce up some of our inside spaces as well. Bagels, fruit and coffee will be available to keep workers' energy tanks full throughout the morning. We hope you'll join the effort!



We are thrilled with the work that has been done to maintain and beautify our meetinghouse. Our Trustees and Building & Grounds Team have coordinated and completed the following:

- The interior of the Education Building has been painted in its entirety.
- Seven rooms in the Main Building have been painted.
- All interior doors and door frames in the Main Building have been painted.
- All exterior windows and moldings on the Main Building have been painted.
- Wood moldings have been extended to all of the vestibule area
- Water damage on the wall and by the front doors has been repaired and painted.
- All tile floors in both buildings have been refurbished.

There is more to come! The following projects are currently being scheduled:

- Our steeple and colonnade will be painted once drier conditions allow.
- Carpets in the Education Building will be replaced.
- Matching window coverings will be installed in both buildings.

BENEVOLENCE FUND

Our Benevolence Fund is used to aid individuals or families in need. The fund is reserved for helping in situations where there are basic necessities that will not otherwise be met. Some examples of benevolence distributions in the past have helped with healthcare needs, assistance to a family following a fire, and living

(continued from page 2) restore a wintered and weary world. Yes, part of that story is in a cross, the choice of one person to so fully commit to God's call, even at the risk of certain death. But the cross is also a realization of all the unseen things God is doing to remake a barren tree into a thriving oak. The life of Jesus, God in our midst, withstood the winter of the world, because it was a tree rooted in fertile soil. For me, the Lenten season is about recognizing that we have a chance to be part of that fertile soil. It is the practice of being intentionally observant for all the ways God is working in the soil beneath a barren oak.

How can we do that? One way is to expand our imagery of God. If we can see God in a cross, and in a tree, and in the soil, we can see God in all sorts of places. In the season ahead, worship will be filled with activities that imagine God in both traditional and nontraditional ways. If we open ourselves to seeing God in new spaces and places, we might also find fertile soil, one where we are surprised again by the beauty, love, and warmth of an Easter oak.

(continued from page 2) me why I read my prayers in worship (prayers that I prayed as I wrote them and as I delivered them). Subsequent questions and comments were full of innuendo about my fitness for the job and my ability to fulfill it: The overseeing of a large budget, the marshaling of volunteers, the maintenance of several projects and proposals for new ones all came in for their share of a doubted accomplishment.

The disruption of the established order held more joy and promise than fear, however. Particularly the women of the church sensed a new day and rejoiced in it. To see a woman in the pulpit on a regular basis, even though in a minor role, was uplifting and affirming to them. They felt their full acceptance by God in a new and powerful way. And their support gave me the confidence to move to another church, as I accepted a pastoral role. To a church in which the disruptive presence of women in ministry was accepted as a mirror of the disruptive presence of Jesus whose life encourages us also to work at breaking apart the world's domination system, through whatever medium that system is expressed.
