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REOPENING THE MEETINGHOUSE - SAFETY FIRST

We are anxious to return to the Sardis Meetinghouse! It has been emotionally difficult to be physically separated from our church family for such a long time, but the difficulty of separation pales in comparison to the difficulties we would face if a decision to reopen too soon led to illness of a Sardis friend. We believe slow and steady is a wiser adage than fast and furious, and we will err on the side of caution and safety.

Given the circumstances, we feel we have been able to provide meaningful worship and virtual gatherings using technology available to us. Worship over Zoom is not perfect, but it has allowed most of us to stay connected to one another. Sardis staff, deacons, and trustees gathered together at the end of May, and developed a plan for deeper connection with Sardis friends unable to participate in virtual worship and events. We also discussed the possibility of having staff members gather together to broadcast worship from the sanctuary. Amanda Lewis shared a sobering story about a sister church who did so. One of their staff members was unknowingly infected with the coronavirus at the time, causing a great deal of turmoil for their congregation. Deacons and trustees agreed that for the time being, Sardis staff members will continue to bring worship to you from their homes. This decision will be reevaluated at the end of June.

We know this pandemic has robbed us of many comfortable ways our Sardis community operates, and we recognize that Sardis will not feel like we want Sardis to feel for quite some time. Medical experts expect it will be 12-24 months before a vaccine is available for Covid-19. When the time comes to open our meetinghouse doors, many Sardis friends may not feel comfortable attending services.

We will move forward during this time of transition one step at a time, all the while considering what is best for the greater good.

Staff, deacons, and trustees appreciate your patience and participation in our efforts. We welcome your input into the process. Staff is planning

an opportunity for a churchwide forum to discuss these matters on Wednesday, June 24th. Stay tuned to your Sardis emails for more information.

Some thoughts from a pastor in quarantine:

Prayers: One of the things I've missed during our virtual worship services is the ability to participate in extemporaneous prayer – we share our joys and concerns in real time. To me, there's nothing more special than creating sacred, safe spaces where our congregation can share things that are happening in our lives, and never feel as if those things are too trivial or too weighty to voice aloud. In the interim, a small group of us have been participating in virtual Friday prayers. We've shared our joys and concerns, not to mention making art and paper airplanes, singing hymns, and laughing a lot. We want you to know there's plenty of space for all to take part.


Being Baptist: We spent the month of May exploring our denominational roots in a Wednesday evening study. When I planned this discussion, I imagined a lot of conversation around the what and how of our congregation: sacraments, polity, theology, etc. What I discovered is that you are much more interested in the why and who of our congregation: the expression of our community's spirit and the mindset of each individual in relation to the whole. I think that's what makes us *Sardis Baptist*: we're not a community of procedures, we're a community of neighbors discerning the call of God's spirit in our lives, both individually and collectively.

Ahmaud Arbery: Last week, Ruthye shared an article with me from the Bitter Southerner by Jim Barger. We both noted his connection to Furman (Go Paladins!), but more so, we were moved by Barger's poignant, raw, and challenging words. Barger explores the community Ahmaud Arbery was a part of, and he invites us to consider the systematic injustices that led to Arbery's tragic death. This is not an easy read, in fact it's quite painful. But I think it's a helpful one as we seek to discern how we might be an expression of God's love and justice in our community.

Election season is upon us, and elections matter! Five months from now we will select representatives for federal, state, and local offices: US President. US and NC House and Senate Representatives, Governor, Judges, School Boards, and others. Sardis Baptist has no opinion on who you vote for; we just encourage you to do so.

Although NC is moving forward slowly with plans to reopen our state, we know there are people in the Covid -19 high risk category who may not feel comfortable converging in crowded precincts on November 3rd. The Mecklenburg County Board of Elections provides a safe way for you to exercise your right to vote from home. Any voter registered in Mecklenburg County can request an absentee ballot from now until mid-October. Requests are expected to be greater than usual this year; you are encouraged to request now so the staff can process requests in a timely manner. Click here for a printable absentee ballot form, or call the Board of Elections to request one by mail (704-336.2133). Requesting an absentee ballot does not obligate you to vote by mail. Absentee ballots will be mailed out beginning September 4th.



A HOLY TRINITY

June 7th is the day the Church celebrates the doctrine of the Trinity. God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Ghost. One God, three persons—this is what the church of my childhood taught me. Does this make sense to you? I didn't understand then, and truthfully, this is language I don't understand now. Historical context is helpful and gives me some needed perspective, but is not enough to enlighten me.

The trinitarian doctrine was adopted in response to debate over the nature of God. The monotheistic Church was accused of worshipping multiple Gods, and its purpose was to explain the oneness of God/Jesus/Holy Spirit. The creeds provided a statement of orthodoxy, or right beliefs, for adherents to the religion. It's a theological construct that was devised more for the purpose of political power than spiritual understanding. The doctrine was codified in the fourth century with the Nicene Creed which was adopted in 325 AD and amended in 381 AD. It continues to be recited regularly in many churches today.

Despite the political reasoning behind the original intent, the Church has held onto the doctrine of the trinity for almost 1700 years, indicating its value in the religious experience of many people over long periods of time. My personal difficulty with the language of the trinity, as it was taught to me, is not surprising. I often struggle with traditional religious language. Seeking new words for old ideas helps me understand the essence of what I may have misunderstood or overlooked because of my perspective in a different period of time, place and culture than those who developed the idea.

A few years ago I came across an article about the trinity with words that spoke to my ever-changing experience of God, and somewhat enlightened my personal understanding of the great mystery: God Beyond Us, God Between Us, God Within Us, https://progressiveChristianity.org/resources/god-beyond-god-between-god-within-a-trinity. The Trinity has been debated since its inception. The nature of God is a mystery, and by definition, that means God cannot be explained. My hope and my prayer is that we never stop trying!
