WORLD COMMUNION SUNDAY

More than two thousand years ago, thousands of miles away, in an upper room, lesus shared a simple meal with a couple dozen of his closest friends. He told them that the bread and cup were for them; he told them that he loved them; he told them that each time they gathered in the same manner, his spirit would be there. The spirit of that first table has drifted through space and time, spanning continents and generations, and sustaining the radical hospitality of Jesus.

On World Communion Sunday, we'll celebrate the global nature of this table. Christians around the world will speak the ancient words in their own tongues, partake in the bread and cup of their native diets, and somehow, someway, we'll all be connected.

To honor this global table, our worship will include special music, a sharing of community from friends around the world (Norway, England, Russia, and Africa), and an intentional reflection on what Christianity looks, feels, and sounds like in a myriad of cultures.

Bring bread and wine (or juice and crackers) to virtual worship with you on Sunday, October 4th. We've also sent a mailing through the postal service for you to open with friends during the service.

In this age of polarization, there are very few things we can agree on, but some things transcend politics. One of those things is the right of all people, especially children, to have consistent access to food and clean water. It's not that we have a lack of these things. Instead, it's a problem of resource allocation — and not just in places far away from Charlotte. As a matter of fact, nearly one in four NC school children are food insufficient, meaning that they aren't sure where their next meal will come from. There are neighbors right here in Mecklenburg County that don't have access to clean water, nor do they have consistent access to supermarkets that offer the fresh produce and clean foods that children (and adults) need to thrive.

Again, it's not for lack of these things. Rather, it's because of an indifference to waste and resource allocation. The annual CROP Hunger Walk of Charlotte, NC (and others like it around the country) provides much needed awareness to the issues surrounding global and local hunger. Although CROP gives us a tangible way to help, the walk's success isn't just about miles covered or dollars raised. It's about sustaining intentional behavior to eradicate hunger. When we know where our food comes from, how and to whom it's distributed (or not distributed), and the effect our food practices have on our neighbors, we become more empathetic, more pro-active, and more determined to be good neighbors - neighbors who feed the world, not hoard its food.

In order to keep all participants safe, CROP Walk Charlotte 2020 will be virtual, meaning there will not be a mass gathering. Participants will be encouraged to walk on their own on October 11th, and to raise funds supporting the effort. You do not have to walk to assist our team. 
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1 confess.


I remember that this is still the Not Yet. But I also remember what Will Be. Matter of fact it's breaking into this one right now.
