Here are a few teasers about 2016-2020 review while you wait:

Did you know that Sardis has received more than \$1 million in financial contributions to support its ministries in the past five years? Did you know that nearly fifteen percent of those contributions have been used to directly support local missions and outreach here in Charlotte, or to grow the internal ministries and programing of Sardis?

Did you know that enough people have attended Sardis programming in the last five years to fill Spectrum Arena (home of the Charlotte Hornets)? And that's saying something, because the Hornets can't fill it up unless LeBron's in town!

Did you know that Jonathan has delivered more than 3,000 doughnuts for worship (enough boxes to stack from floor to ceiling of the meetinghouse), and that our Keurig has cranked out more than 3,500 cups of coffee, just shy of 300 gallons, which we think would fill the baptismal!

Did you know that Tillie has conducted 60 interviews of Sardis people, each one compelling!

Did you know our choir has performed more than 200 anthems, Hilary and Irena have directed and accompanied more than 750 hymns, Sardis lay leaders have offered more than 500 original prayers, and Kathryn has designed more than 250 worship guides, 60 newsletters, and 200 weekly emails?!?

I LIFT UP MINE EYES... Rev. Bob Stillerman

TURN AROUND – You may not remember, but on the Sunday after the Presidential Inauguration in 2017, I turned all of the chairs in the meeting-house 90 degrees counterclockwise. As a result, we were completely reoriented in worship – the choir and worship window were beside of us, instead of in front of us. You hated it! You really hated seeing the exit sign above the Communion Table, and you really hated that you had to turn your head to see the choir, and you hated that people somehow seemed closer vertically, but further away horizontally, and you hated how cumbersome it was to pass the peace of Christ.

I admit it. I failed in getting you to like the new seating arrangement. But I didn't fail in my larger purpose, which was to redirect your attention. Don't get me wrong, I realize we are connected to the world, and the leaders we elect do have a significant impact on our lives, and on the lives of our neighbors. But in that season, I sensed that we had been SO focused on the current election, that we let its outcome supersede the importance of other pivotal elements in our lives: our attention to sacred rhythms; our attention to how we stay connected in seasons of polarization; our attention to the ongoing work of Sardis, regardless of the party in power.

And for the first time in many months, your hallway conversations to me the following week were not about what you'd seen or heard on the news. You told me you needed to see the worship window; you told me you needed to see everybody's face; you told me you needed the consistency of your sacred space. And I noticed in each of you a resolve to let Sardis be a source of comfort, wisdom, and provocation in your lives.

Here we are four years later. And my invitation remains the same. Yes, turn on the cable news when you make breakfast – it's good to be informed. But when you can, turn around, and look, and listen, and be in conversation with your faith community, too. Here, in this place, you might just find some reassurance that the Spirit's gonna keep working, regardless of how well the systems are functioning. And you might just find the inspiration to be a force that repairs those systems in need of reform. But don't worry, I'll keep you pointing North in the meetinghouse.



WAYNE & DEBBIE WIKE

The vocations of Wayne and Debbie Wike have found them responding in various places: educational institutions, state organizations, local churches, and family interactions. In their forty-four years of marriage, Sardis has been the church where they were members longest. They left Sardis as Wayne answered a call to be pastor of the First Baptist Church of Laurinburg. Debbie was also looking at a change in her teaching career. With the onset of grandchildren, Debbie began thinking of resigning from public school teaching and taking on the joy of learning with her children's off-spring.

The Wikes still live in Laurinburg, but Wayne retired from the church there this past year. He had planned to retire in May. However, the corona virus changed that goal slightly. With the state stay-at-home requirement being announced just a week after his retirement announcement, Wayne agreed to stay with the church through its first months of internet worship. His retirement became official the first Sunday in November of 2020. Shortly thereafter he was asked to become the interim pastor at First Baptist Church of Mount Gilead which he accepted and where he also does his preaching on-line.

Retirement has not found the Wikes withdrawing from useful occupation. The home front has kept them fully occupied. They have remodeled their house, adding a study for Wayne. Wayne has also taken up woodworking and does much of the home repair work. Debbie enjoys painting and especially likes working with acrylics. They have planted a garden on part of their acre lot and enjoy the fruits of their labor when they sit down to meals.

Grandchildren still fill their lives with happiness though currently there is not as much in-person interaction with them. Debbie and Wayne's three children have given them six grandchildren, with two sets of twins. The thirteen-year-old girls live in Georgia; the four-year-old boy and girl live in Charlotte. The twins' two cousins, girls, three and five years old, also live in Charlotte.
