us to be in relationships with others. Such relationships help define who we are as a Christian community. Approximately 80% of our survey responders indicated that relationships with other Sardis folks bring them energy.

Bob shared an interesting fact about flamingos in a recent sermon: they are social creatures who flock together. Their behaviors are dysfunctional when isolated, so zookeepers often house sick flamingos in mirrored rooms to increase their comfort levels. Many of us also fail to thrive in isolation. Covid-19 has continued to make gathering together as a large group difficult, so Bob has challenged us to consider how we can develop our relationships with one another beyond traditional ways. Be creative in your efforts to help us sustain the health of our flock! Phone calls, video chats, text threads, and old-fashioned greeting cards are a few ways to stay in touch with those who haven't returned to the Sardis nest.

Your responses to our recent survey also indicated that anxiety surrounding Covid-19 continues to drain energy for many of you. About 60% of responders mentioned the Delta variant in their open-ended answers. Our church leaders have had countless conversations in recent months about balancing the desire for social connection with the need for safety protocols. Our grandmothers might tell us we want our cake and to eat it too!



I LIFT UP MINE EYES...

I haven't watched as many Braves games as I do in a usual summer, but I've managed to see a few on TV. What's remarkable, is that twice



This pattern is indicative of our world. Whether it's a ballgame, or vaccines, or elections, we're living in an age where different conclusions are drawn from the same evidence. And people are SO entrenched in their original thinking that they can never be open to a different outcome. In other words, we all bring our biases into the world we interpret. What a hard place to be!

As our children (of all ages!) begin a new school year, they'll balance bias and knowledge. How they understand their neighbors now will affect their ability to embrace how past generations have shaped them. How they desire to treat their neighbors now will inform the choices they make in learning the skills to serve their neighbors in the future. How much energy they put into obtaining knowledge now will affect how much knowledge they can retain in adulthood and beyond.

As a church, I believe the best way we can help our children is to model practiced empathy. There will always be something to disagree about. That's just human nature. But there's never a time when we can't be open to considering how our neighbors arrive at different conclusions. We might discover that even though our process of thinking is different, we still share commonalities: anxiety about an uncertain future; hope for our children; a desire to do what God is calling us to do; a mutual disdain for instant replay!

The practiced empathy of Jesus revealed that Samaritans are neighbors, too; that God's love can ooze from friend and foe alike; that both Maries and Marthas are doing needed work; that Torah's application can take all sorts of forms, as long as its rooted in God's spirit.

In the year ahead, may we help our children to learn those things necessary to building convictions that are tempered with compassion. And may their goodness rub off on us!

It's that time of year again—the exciting time when schools are newly back in-session and our choir begins having rehearsals again. Unfortunately, we are still in the midst of a global pandemic with no obvious end in sight.

So, how will the Sardis Choir respond? According to the CDC, "Singing (and instrumental music produced by woodwind or brass instruments) are thought to be higher-risk activities for COVID-19 spread due to the aggressive expelling of respiratory droplets. This can result in aerosols that can hang in the air for hours. It is important to take extra precautions when participating in musical activities, especially if they involve vocalists and wind instrument musicians who are not yet vaccinated." Lucky for us, all of our choir members have been vaccinated, but we are still going to be taking precautions.

As you may have noticed during worship, the choir is remaining masked while singing, and as we begin rehearsals, we will be masking and social distancing. In an abundance of caution we will also be limiting anthems and special music to soloists and small groups. We have also been doing some research into "Singing Masks" which will make things more comfortable for the choir.

With all of that said, we have an exciting compromise to announce! Instead of weekly anthems performed by the choir, we will be preparing for an outdoor concert to be performed in the late fall. Being outdoors will help to dissipate the droplets produced more quickly and we are hoping that by October or early November the weather will have cooled down enough to be comfortable without being frigid.
