ADVENT: THE GOSPEL OF SARDIS

Gospel is a fancy word for truth. In the Christian faith, gospel takes its form in story. We're familiar with the gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke, and John. Some of us may even be familiar with apocryphal (additional) gospels like Thomas. But too often, we fail to recognize the most important gospels: our own stories of truth!

The stories in our sacred texts reflect communities of faith seeking to make sense of the life of Jesus. Something about him was true. Somehow, someway, Jesus made God more accessible, more present, and more realized in everyday, relational encounters – we often call them kin-dom moments. No, we weren't firsthand witnesses to that first supper, or to the feeding of the multitudes, or to the healing miracles. But we have known tables. And we have been fed. And we have found healing. God is true and present in our own lives. Our gospel, the Gospel of Sardis, speaks a powerful truth. Perhaps the Advent season is the perfect time for us to speak and hear our truth anew.

Good stories always start with hope! As we prepare to welcome the Christ child, it's important to remember that we are in the process of becoming. YHWH, the name of our God, means "I am who I will be." God has created each of us, just as we are, in order that we might become who we will be. Hope reminds us that God is present and inbreaking; we are moving toward God, and God toward us. Hope helps us believe that ours is a story worth telling!

Hope leads to peace. Peace is less about the absence of conflict, and more about the access of space. When we hope, we become more aware of the peaceful spaces God provides, and we gain confidence in the expression of our gifts. If hope allows us to conceive of the story, perhaps peace allows us the stillness and purpose to compose it. Peace. Be still. And know that I am God. And know that I've got you!

Dreamers hope. Stories take form in peaceful spaces. Spoken stories bring joy. Joy that we are not alone. Joy that we can find the divine in our ordinary activities, too. Joy that God is invested in our world. Joy that we play a part in making God's world a reality.

We hope for a story. We find peace of mind to tell it. We experience joy in its telling. Joy provokes us to love. In telling of God's love, we experience God's love for ourselves. The spirit stirs us to share that love with others.

The season is here, Sardis. We've got a gospel full of hope, peace, joy, and love. Come and speak, "Truth!" with us.

Dawtchin was the sobriquet of Rev. Dr. Daynette Snead Perez when she served on the pastoral staff of the First Chin Baptist Church in New Bern. The congregation of refugees from Myanmar designated her: one who "loves the Chin people." When she preaches for Sardis on the 12th of December, she will be wearing the stole they presented to her when she finished her ministry there. As the founder of her company DIASPRA, LLC, Dr. Perez could be described as one who loves people. Fill in the blank with any ethnicity, gender, generation, or social class. The company is focused on making one aware of diversity and inclusion and on aiding in the societal recovery from systemic injustice. Stranger to Neighbor ministry is a part of DIASPRA. Her recently published book, Church: What to Do When Everyone Is Like You, also promotes building relationships with people who are different.

Daynette helped Trenton, NC, rebuild after Hurricane Florence. She was the local response coordinator for the Haiti (Hey-tie) community, coordinating volunteer teams who came to help dig out from flood debris left by six feet of water covering the community. She now serves as manager of CBF National Domestic Disaster Response. Under her leadership the 1000 Bucket Challenge was launched in Louisiana, providing 2021 hurricane victims with buckets of cleaning supplies.

The Richmond, VA native grew up with seven brothers and sisters. Her educational experience includes Shenadoah University, degree in music; Regent University, M. Div.; and Gardner-Webb University, D. Min. She was ordained by First Baptist Church, New Bern.


Daynette and husband Pedro recently celebrated their second wedding anniversary. Their four adult children live along the east coast: New York, Baltimore, and Atlanta.

CHRISTMAS REMEMBRANCES

Traditionally during Advent, we offer the opportunity to honor or memorialize special people in our lives with poinsettias displayed on Christmas Eve as a visual reminder of the love and appreciation we feel. During worship, the names of honorees are read aloud. This year we are putting worship in action and honoring our loved ones differently. We invite you to make a donations to Goodness Groceries in lieu of purchasing poinsettias.

The primary benefactor of Goodness Groceries is Charlotte Secondary School. CSS is a nearby charter school where 60% of students qualify for free and reduced lunch. The Goodness Groceries food pantry opened in the Spring of 2020 at the beginning of the COVID-19 pandemic. Initially the plan was to provide food for hungry students and their families during Spring break and Easter. Your continued outpouring of support has enabled the school to continue providing assistance to families in need for more than a year and a half. Funds from Goodness Groceries are used to stock the school's food pantry, and also to provide school supplies for economically insecure students.
