Beginning in August, you will see more movement and energy around the Sardis grounds on weekday mornings. The trustees of Sardis Baptist Church have entered into an agreement with **The Garden Progressive Preschool**. The mission of the school is to "provide a fun and nurturing environment that allows students the opportunity to explore and discover their own unique and creative talents and to generate a community of learners that has a deep love and respect for others, for their environment and for themselves." **The Garden** welcomes families with children between the ages of 2.5 and 6.

The educational philosophy of a Progressive Education is heavily influenced by Dr. Maria Montessori and Jean Piaget, among others. Fundamental to the philosophy is a deep respect for a child's ability to learn through experience. All experiential opportunities in **The Garden** classrooms fall into one of four main categories: Sensorimotor (life skills, constructive play, classification and manipulative work/play), Art (visual, musical, theatrical), Language and Mathematics (opportunities are based on interest and readiness). 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I LIFT UP MINE EYES... Rev. Bob Stillerman

Several years ago, Susan Phillips sent a sweet note to Mary Allen and Lucy, and she signed it: "Love, Your Church Buddies, Danny and Susan." Ever since receiving that note, everyone



our family sees at Sardis is our Church Buddy. And the term has spread like wildfire at Sardis. "Tell me about the people you go to church with" someone might ask. "They're my buddies," Sardisians reply.

A buddy is a wonderful thing for a young person to have in their lives. Buddies laugh with us. Buddies have fun with us. Buddies are interested in us. They encourage us; they pat us on the back when we're having a tough day; they bandage skinned knees. Buddies want to share their lives with us, and we want to share our lives with them. Buddies bring community to life. When we are around our buddies, we know we've got a group of people who get us and have always got us.

Well guess what? I think buddies are a wonderful thing for adults of every season to have, too! When we have buddies, the spaces we occupy affirm and encourage us to be ourselves, and they open us to embracing new ideas. When we have buddies, and seek to keep making new buddies, we're less likely to feel like we are intruding on spaces, and more likely to feel like we are discovering places. But more than anything, when we have buddies, we know we have neighbors who are experiencing the journey with us.

Last month, in our Stanger to Neighbor series with Daynette Snead Perez, we considered (and we will keep on considering!) how we might share more of Sardis with the world – how might we engage people with different cultural backgrounds than our own? I believe that one of things we can do is to tell people about our Church Buddies!

To that end, we have created our very own Sardis Baptist Church Buddies stickers (pictured above). Put one on your laptop, your favorite coffee mug, your car bumper, or your fridge. And when somebody asks, "What's a church buddy?" you'll have a great opportunity to tell them. And who knows, we might just meet a few new buddies in the process.

The first batch of stickers are available in the meetinghouse.

WHAT IS LECTIO DIVINA?

Lectio divina is a method for interacting with scripture. It's a practice that involves both reading and prayer, but is different from traditional study of biblical texts. Lectio divina is not an intellectual process; it's a spiritual and contemplative process where you are quiet and receptive to God's word. It evokes an emotional rather than cerebral response; think of it as formation rather than instruction.


Lectio divina provides opportunity for reflecting prayerfully on a chosen scripture passage. There are various methods for this practice, but traditionally four stages:

READ. A scripture passage is read slowly and listened to thoughtfully. What word or phrase captures your attention and grabs your heart? It's important not to force ideas, but wait patiently for God to give gentle guidance.

REFLECT. The passage is read slowly again, and listened to prayerfully. The second reading deepens the focus on what you became aware of during the first reading. Try not to analyze the passage. What is God saying to you in this passage? Offering you? Asking you? What feelings are arising within you?

RESPOND. Slowly and prayerfully, read the passage again. Respond to God from your heart. Speak to God of your feelings and insights. Offer these to God. You may do this silently, by writing in a journal, or in a group setting you may be offered an opportunity to share your response. In a group setting, lectio divina is about listening to the experiences of others and how they might inform your experience. It is never about a particular belief of point of view.

REST. Possibly read the passage another time. Sit quietly and contemplate God's presence. Rest in God's love.


