FOUNDING DEAN OF WAKE FOREST DIVINITY SCHOOL DR. BILL LEONARD AT SARDIS ON NOVEMBER 19TH

Dr. Bill Leonard, Professor Emeritus of Divinity, Wake Forest University, will lead the Sardis congregation to look at the history of and continuing influence of Baptists in the life of our nation. On Sunday, November 19th, he will meet with Sardis folk at 9:45 AM to give insight on who Baptists have been and are. At 11:00 he will continue the theme in the morning worship service.


An aficionado of church history, Dr. Leonard is especially drawn to Baptist studies and American religion with particular interest in the Appalachian region. His study of the subject was pursued at Texas Wesleyan (B.A.), Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary (M. Div.), Boston University (Ph. D.) and at Yale University (post-doctoral work).

Prominent pastor, author, and professor of preaching, Dr. Steve Shoemaker avers, "Bill Leonard is one of our best teachers of American Religious History and an astute theological observer of religion in American today." Dr. Leonard taught church history at Southern Seminary, was Department Chair of Religion and Philosophy at Samford University and was the founding dean (1996) of the Wake Forest University Divinity School, as well as being named the James and Marilyn Dunn Chair of Baptist Studies there in 2012. During his teaching career, he was visiting professor at Seinan Gakuin University in Fukuoka, Japan. Dr. Leonard retired from teaching in 2018.

Karen Richardson Dunn, a well-being counselor at Wake Forest / Asheville, interviewed Leonard upon his retirement. She described him as "crackling with energy." His greatest hope for the future of the church: the human beings who sit in his classroom. "They are...agents of compassion, reconciliation and justice." His greatest lega-

cy: "My greatest gift was to interact about ideas, issues and the Gospel with a group of students who ARE the legacy."

The author or editor of 25 books, Dr. Leonard's latest offering is Homebrewed Christianity Guide to Church History: Flaming Heretics and Heavy Drinkers. He is also a regular columnist for Baptist News Global and a sought-after speaker on church history and the changing shape of religion in America. The Bill J. Leonard papers are housed in the Z. Smith Reynolds Library Special Collections and Archives of Wake Forest University.

SARDIS BAPTIST'S NOVEMBER PROCLAIMERS

Interaction with the Bible is one way that has brought individuals and churches to this moment in their lives. Along the way of their faith journey, November's proclaimers have found that there are certain Bible stories which appeal to them in a thoughtful, provoking way.

REV. DANIEL RUSHING

Rev. Rushing is drawn to the story of the Demoniac of the Gadarenes because of its many layers. The demoniac tells Jesus that his name is "Legion," reminding one of the Roman legions who occupied Israel at the time. As many domination systems do, Rome tried to destroy the unique identifications of the people they conquered. In the process of a culture losing its identity, many individuals lose a sense of who they are. The story gives hope as the demoniac is restored to a sense of who he positively is.

Daniel grew up in Troy, NC. He graduated from Lee University in Cleveland, Tennessee and from the Gardner-Webb School of Divinity. Presently in the real estate business, he has pastored churches in Charlotte and in Asheville and has been an adjunct professor of New Testament studies. Daniel and his wife Crystal have two daughters. Bianca is a college student and Olivia is a high school senior.





REV. REBECCA PROCTOR

Rev. Proctor claims the story of Esther as one of her favorites. It is the story of a young woman who is a citizen of an oppressed minority. With the help of family and friends who have influence in high places, she is positioned to become and be named Queen. Because she is in the right place at the right time, Esther is empowered to save her people from annihilation and give them hope for the future.

Becky grew up in Salem, Virginia. She attended Hollins University where Lottie Moon was educated. (Lottie was a nineteenth century Baptist missionary to China.) Then she graduated from Madison College (now James Madison University) with a degree in music and English. She was first in her class at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary. Serving in churches in Virginia, Becky has held positions with music, youth and children, and religious education. Sardis is one of the churches benefiting from her minister-of-music talents. Her husband Rick is also an integral part of the music program, lending his first-class tenor voice to the Sardis choir.

REV. LEDAYNE MCLEESE POLASKI

Rev. Polaski is partial to the story of Peter and Cornelius, where everything that Peter knows to be good and right and moral is upended. "I am mystified as to why this story hasn't had more influence in the church," she says.

LeDayne grew up in Greenville, SC and graduated from Furman University. Post graduate work was completed at Duke University School of Divinity and she was ordained by Watts Street Baptist Church in Durham. (Watts Street holds the distinction of ordaining, in 1962, the first Baptist woman to the gospel ministry.) She is currently the Executive Director of Mecklenburg Ministries. Previously she was director of the Baptist Peace Fellowship of North America. LeDayne's work with these organizations has been ecumenical and inclusive. She has led groups in the examination of conflict transformation and has trained others

in trauma awareness and resilience. Her husband Tom is a professor at Winthrop and their daughter Kate is a recent Meredith graduate.






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INTERIM PASTOR UPDATE

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Simple Gifts



"Tis the gift to be simple, 'tis the gift to be free, 'tis the gift to come down where we ought to be..."

Although the Shakers who wrote this hymn are not the traditional pilgrims we think of around Thanksgiving, their story is very similar and just as important to the history of the United States.

The United Society of Believers in Christ's Second Appearing, the Shakers as they were more commonly known because of their "ecstatic dancing" ("About the Shakers" from pbs.org), came to North America in 1774, led by Ann Lee, or Mother Ann as her followers called her. They left Manchester, England, looking for religious tolerance and settled near Albany, New York. "The Shakers believed society could be perfected and a paradise on earth created through communal living, gender and racial equality, pacifism, confession of sin, celibacy, and separation from the world" ("The Shakers"

from shakermuseum.us). Radical beliefs yes, but we at Sardis would probably agree with them on many, if not all, of their teachings.

"When true simplicity is gained, to bow and to bend we shan't be ashamed..."

The Shaker community has dwindled through the years, but their many contributions, and this song in particular, have stood the test of time. Though it was mostly unknown to the outside world, the greater population was made aware of the song in 1944, almost 100 years after its composition, when Aaron Copland incorporated the tune into his ballet Appalachian Spring. Then, in 1950, he included an arrangement in his first set of "Old American Songs." It was performed at President Ronald Reagan's second inauguration, President Bill Clinton's first inauguration, and President Barack Obama's first inauguration ("Song of the Week: Simple Gifts" by Raina Sayer for themusicclass.com). Many of us are also familiar with "Lord of the Dance," an adaptation of the tune composed by Sydney Carter in 1963.

With its uncomplicated melody, its message of simplicity and freedom, and the people who gave us this hymn in the first place, it's no wonder that "Simple Gifts" is still with us. If we step back and take stock, we have a lot to be thankful for, and though we may experience much "turning" in our lives, "by turning, turning we come 'round right."

What bubbled up was the memory of a spring on my grandfather's land. On a tree beside it was a nail on which hung an aluminum drinking dipper. We only needed one because we all drank from the same dipper (I know!) and that water was the best water I've ever had. In that bubbling up, I thought of all the times I've heard about Jesus offering living water. Isn't it a good thing that there's no performance necessary for it?
