Sardis Baptist Church affirms that every person is a beloved child of God, created in God's image and worthy of love, respect, and inclusion. Sardis People: **Susan Phillips**

"I've been searchin', searchin' every which a'way," the Coasters sang several decades ago. The Pastor
Search Team, led by Susan Phillips, has been "searchin'" as well! Searching and researching to bring a candidate for pastor to the church. The team has become a search engine, a job made a little different in a world powered by computers from those Coaster days. "We took your visioning suggestions and thoughts and went to work," says Susan.

Susan was on the team ten years ago that found and recommended Sardis's last pastor, Rev. Bob Stillerman. Before becoming a member of Sardis, she was herself a minister. A minister to children in a Charlotte church, she was also an associational and state leader in children's work, often leading workshops for other children's ministers. Since coming to Sardis, she has volunteered time, energy and expertise to our children and preschool programs among other contributions, which currently include the Worship Development Team.

The Worship Development Team collaborates with staff to create ideas for presenting and enhancing worship. In addition to sharing thought-provoking and inventive ideas with the team, she is the creative genius behind our worship displays which are designed to bring attention to how our theology applies to our culture (consider the Native American display for July), accentuate messages (salt, light, and a bushel basket for the well known passage in Matthew), or to honor important events in the lives of Sardis people (see the display for Jonathan's retirement, pictured on the back page).

Other members of the Pastor Search Team include Becky Proctor, who has communicated with prospects; Amy Wiebke, who has corralled ideas from team members into cohesive documents needed for the process; Shannon Roberts, who has kept records of team meetings; Jim Owen and Luther Fisher, who have added their own areas of expertise in finance and investigation; and Tillie Duncan, staff liaison.

"Gonna find her," sang the Coasters, intent on meeting their goal. The Pastor Search Team is positive about finding a candidate who is a good fit for Sardis. "We search for a leader/pastor to walk with us into the future. It is a daunting task but our faithful, insightful team has had productive inspiring work! That work will be culminating soon [and is being accomplished] by deep discernment and prayer," says Susan, intent on finding him/her.



A Spiritually Progressive Community of Faith



The language we use to describe music is often used to describe other aspects of life as well. Think of something being described as a "prelude" to something else, or making "overtures" to someone as a lead in to a relationship. Well, I would like to delve into something that is less commonly known, but just as important.

In daily life, we might talk about the "cadence" of someone's voice, the ups and downs that help us understand the meaning behind their words. Music has the exact same thing. A cadence in musical terms is a progression of chords at the end of a section that leads us to understand whether the work is complete or if there is still more to come.

When you hear the first phrase of "Happy Birthday to you," you can almost hear that comma wanting you to move on to the next "Happy Birthday to you!" These are both examples of musical cadences. The first is called a half cadence or imperfect cadence – it is incomplete; the second is a perfect cadence—it feels finished.

There are two other types as well: a deceptive cadence tries to trick you into thinking you're heading for a perfect cadence but surprises you with a sad, minor turn; and perhaps the most useful for our purpose, the plagal or Church cadence is one we sing every Sunday – it is literally the extra "Amen" at the end of Old hymns, including the Doxology.

So when you are listening to your favorite songs, try to pick out those spots where the verse is leading to the chorus and see if you can pick out the cadence the musicians are using. Are they leading you where you expect them to? Are they trying to surprise you with something unexpected? Often the lyrics will work alongside cadences to tell you where the song is headed. Enjoy!

If you'd like to follow the pattern from my latest
Spiritual Direction session, read the passage above and
afterwards have a five-minute period of silence to consider what
the passage is saying to you. If necessary, read it several times
to yourself before pondering what it means to you.
As I pondered, one thing that stood out to me was the use
of the word, "give" instead of the word we expect to find, "ask."
We usually read, "Ask and it shall be given to you."
My director called it a "generous verse."

As I write my final signposts article, the word 'give' is inspiring me. It is my hope that I have been generous to all of you and fulfilled the call you extended to me 11 years ago. Our parting brings me sorrow, but I have reminisced with many of you about our journey together.

You all know by now that I love to laugh and find humor in so many different places and situations. Sometimes, I think I fainted at the end of a service because God has a sense of humor too and thought it would be funny. Do you remember when I was talking about the window during the symbols of our faith but accidentally said "windur?"

Remembering our journey makes me smile because it brings to mind the many, many times we have chuckled together, belly laughed together and even laughed until we cried. I believe good-natured laughter is a part of the abundant life Jesus promises.

When I reflect upon, "Give and it will be given to you,"

I think about the smiles we've offered and returned to one another, the uplifting stories we've shared with one another, the hugs we've exchanged and the encouraging pats on the back we've given and received in support of each other.

Sardis has been home for me. I must have been giving because the remainder of the verse from Luke 6:38 rings true to me: "Give and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap; for the measure you give will be the measure you get back."

I have received the generous love, support, friendship and acceptance that displays the best of Christian community at Sardis and will remember our season together with gratitude, always.
