



Sardis People: Sandee Landsburg

Language has been a large part of Sandee's life as her double undergraduate major was in speech (public speaking) and math. Math, of course, like language, has structure and tells a kind of story. Her degree is from Albion College, a private liberal arts college in Albion, Michigan. She earned a master's degree in computer science (another kind of language, built largely on math) from the University of Arizona. Sandee used her communicating skills to teach math and computer science, educating students from the level of junior high school to that of college freshmen.

She created HIPPO (Hearing Impaired People and Parents Organization), a support group for parents with a deaf child. In addition to supporting families, the organization did service training in schools to help inform teachers who may have had a deaf child in their classroom.

Sandee grew up in Michigan with one brother and two sisters. There was a short exception of two years when her family lived in New York. She took piano lessons as a child and was accomplished enough to accompany her junior high school choir. She was invited to play in a regional recital consisting of duets by two students not formerly acquainted with each other until they met to prepare. Imagine the grandeur of 12 grand pianos on the same stage!

Married to David, Sandee met him at Albion College where he persuaded her to join the debate team. They have two daughters and three grandchildren and divide their time between North Carolina and Arizona. One of their daughters lives in Charlotte; the other, in Tucson.

Throughout this season of Lent, we are making a conscious effort to add moments of silence and reflection into our Sunday Worship. With that in mind, we have replaced our usual refrain of "Halle, Halle, Halle" with choruses from the Taizé tradition – an intentional, ecumenical monastery in Eastern France that was founded in the 1940s and focuses heavily on their particular musical mode of prayer and meditation. If you have been coming to Sardis for a while, you may remember the Taizé services we used to hold. Taizé is known for, and purposefully writes chants that are simple, highly repetitive, and translatable into whatever language the singer is most familiar with. This allows more people to participate musically than might be able to in standard church services.

Songs in the Taizé tradition are deceptively simple – there is typically only one melody line singing short verses that are either explicitly or closely related to Biblical texts. But the beauty of Taizé is that you can take this uncomplicated vocal line and dress it up in any way you see fit. There are written instrumental parts for piano, violin, viola, cello/bass, flute, trumpet, and guitar, there are optional vocal harmonies, descants, and counter-melodies. Within the single vocal melody, there is also the option to layer the pieces into canons or rounds. A canon or a round is a style of song where there are multiple small groups of singers; one group will start singing a melody and when they get to a specified word or part of their line, another group starts the melody over, adding a layer under the initial iteration. The two groups continue their melodies, offset by a set number of beats, and then a third group might join at the specified spot, and a fourth, and so-on for as many rounds as you would like or have people to create. This style of singing is sometimes used as a musical game, often with the songs "Row Your Boat" or "Frère Jacques."

But the true heart of Taizé is in creative improvisation. The chants are meant to be repeated over and over, until the song takes on a life of its own and ceases to be a musical act, but a prayerful, meditative one where you can engage with others and with the divine on a deeper level. We may not be repeating these choruses very many times on a given Sunday, but in singing the same text week after week, we are hopefully moving toward a place where the songs are familiar enough that we can start to transcend the basic act of singing them into a place where they become Spiritual rather than purely physical. In the coming weeks, pay close attention to how these refrains feel to you, are you becoming more familiar with them? Do you wish we had more time to learn them before we jumped into singing them? Do you not enjoy this style of music at all? All thoughts and feelings are valid, but observing them is part of the process.

CHILDREN'S SUNDAY SCHOOL AT SARDIS BAPTIST

Sunday School can be many things at Sardis. For children since October, Sunday School has been a space to share about their week, to hear what's on their minds, and even to share their favorite "stuffies"!

They explored what ADVENT is and practiced swaddling cloths for a dark skinned baby doll. (They said we shouldn't use the fair skinned doll since Jesus was darker than that!) They learned what worship involves by using the worship guide and moving around the sanctuary. They discovered the baptistry, seeing the view from the choir loft and pulpit (Daniel lifted Eve to see), and sang "Halle, Halle, Halle". Each week they notice the communion table worship display (no prompting). They ask questions and share their amazing interpretations of those visual prompts to worship.

Other weeks we highlighted Hebrew Bible and Christian Testament characters: Moses, Daniel, Ruth and Timothy, (many more to come later).

That study included gleaning real grain from around the sanctuary "field", talk of using river pitch to waterproof a basket, good food choices,

and how a young man weak from illness could learn from family and become a leader.

The month of March we created W-SBC TV Station. Reporters/photographers, Daniel and Eve, interviewed members around campus, microphone in hand.

Our goal was to discover what CHURCH is all about. "What do you like about Sardis?" "What does church mean to you?"

"What do you do at church?" TV interviews were a follow-up to their first Sundays here
